An impact that lasts for decades

20 years after attending the GBB, James is giving back

As a child, James Tran saw The Girls & Boys Brigade as a fun place to go after school. Now an adult, James understands there is much more to it – and he's giving back.

James attended The Girls & Boys Brigade with his sister in the early 1990s. At the time, Surry Hills was a rough area. James recalls walking to school and seeing needles on the street.

"Back when I grew up, it was one of the places in Sydney that you just don't go to," said James.

Still, it was the site of the once-booming rag trade, and many migrants found work there over the years.

James' parents were among them. When they came to Australia as refugees during the Vietnam War, they had no money, no English, and next to no education. Working as garment sewers allowed them to provide for their young family, and The Girls & Boys Brigade helped look after their children while they were at work.

"I just knew it was fun, something that mum and dad let us do," said James. He recalls there being a go-kart track in the basement, where he would race against his schoolmates. "It's those little extra things – like having a go-kart. We never had the space to have one at home, and mum and dad didn't have the money to buy one. We were doing it tough."

James now has two sons and a daughter of his own, which has provided him with a new perspective about his time at The Girls & Boys Brigade. "As a child, you see it as play time. And as an adult, you see it as a program to try to help kids grow up to be the best possible person you can be," said James.

James currently works as the

owner and director of Trixle Branding Group, which provides business signage and other promotional products. Following a recommendation, The Girls & Boys Brigade inquired with Trixle about a bus wrap, and were shocked when James explained that he attended The Brigade as a child. James generously provided our beautiful bus wrapping free of charge.

"Looking back, it's been immensely beneficial. The time we spent at The Girls & Boys Brigade allowed mum and dad to work, and it allowed us to make memories."

"I don't think about it as giving something for free, this is something that I was able to give back," said James. "I was happy to do it."


James recently visited The Girls & Boys

All participants were given a sheet of A3 paper, and were allowed to use any of the supplies

in the craft cupboard to create a competition-ready artwork. The winning artist would receive a \$30 voucher, as well as prime placement of their art in the Youth Room at The GBB.

GBB Youth Coordinator Mr. Bill helped everyone

get in the zone. It didn't take long for their creations to begin taking shape.

"I had my phone set up with music to get them in the groove, and I was taking song requests from the youth," said Bill. "I always participate as well, sometimes I'll do a little example to help inspire the youth. And I'm always there if they need any tips or pointers."

Each of the youth had different ideas about what to base their art on. One chose to draw their family dog, and one did a perspective drawing with different buildings in Surry Hills.

Another found a photo online of a building in Seville in Spain, which she drew in impressive detail.

"Everyone was very unique in their approach, which was good. It was nice that they all used different mediums. They all expressed

> themselves in a different way," said Bill. Paint, crayons, and pencils were just some of the supplies used by the youth.

Art activities like this one are great for so many reasons. Not only

do they encourage young people to develop their talents, but they also encourage selfexpression, connection, and mindfulness.

While the competition is meant to have finished, some of the youth have continued to work on their projects. Choosing a winner will be challenging, as many of the youth put a lot of time and effort into creating some seriously amazing works of art.
